Justice & Outreach Committee Coordinates Support for Area Organizations

The Justice & Outreach Committee oversees the church's regular annual donations to Texas UU Justice Ministry (TXUUJM), Texas Interfaith Impact, Christian Assistance Ministry (CAM), Habitat for Humanity, Parents and Friends of Lesbians And Gays (PFLAG), and the Women's Shelter of Hill Country Crisis Center (formerly Hill Country Cares).

Liaisons for the groups are Susan Lipp (C.A.M.), Carolyn Dreyer (Hill Country Crisis Center), and Curtis Overstreet (PFLAG). There is a need for someone to work with Habitat for Humanity. This liaison would learn about Habitat for Humanity, share information with the congregation, collect needed items for them when appropriate, receive the Donate the Plate gift from the church treasurer and deliver it to a representative of the organization.

In addition, these and other Kerrville community organizations receive an additional monetary gift made possible by the church's "Donate the Plate" program on fifth Sundays. The newest addition to the church's ongoing donation program, Hill Country Crisis Center, serves five counties and not only provides a safe place for women and children fleeing life-threatening danger of domestic violence, but also offers legal aid, counseling, and forensic investigation for abuse cases.

In 2016, Hill Country Crisis Council served 1030 clients; handled 48 cases of else abuse, aided 299 children and provided 1800 shelter nights for clients. As with CAM, there is a special box placed in the rear of the Church Sanctuary to place donations.

In addition to the aforementioned groups, periodically members of this Justice & Outreach Committee sponsor special collections for La Casa de RAICES (Refugee And Immigrant Center for Education and legal Services).

The Justice & Outreach Committee is actively looking for more members and will begin regularly meeting on the fourth Thursday of each month at 2:30 pm in the Palmer Annex. Please contact Committee Chair, Karen Burkett 830.895-7076/ <u>m.k.burkett@att.net</u> for more information.

We, as the people you voted to be your Board members and that you trust to head your committees, will begin working to strengthen the bonds that hold us together, to understand why we come here every Sunday and other days and to strengthen our infrastructure so that we can get back to the spirit of the 12 people who began this congregation and to live up to our mission of creating a space for liberals in the Hill Country.

This is going to be a very exciting time to be a member or a friend of this congregation. If you should happen to run into someone with liberal values invite them to visit with us and many they will come along for the ride.

GETTING TO KNOW YOU Profiles of Our Church Family

From a 2017 Interview with Meredith Henslev

Laurie was born in Providence, Rhode Island, and grew up in upstate New York in the Rochester area.

After graduating from State University of New York at Albany with degrees in English and French, Laurie volunteered for the Peace Corps. As her two-year destination was Malaysia, she first spent several months in Hawaii for intensive language training by native Malay speakers as well as classes in the history of the area and in teaching English as a Second Language. In addition to Malay, other languages are also spoken in Malaysia, including various dialects of Chinese.

When her training was complete, Laurie was sent to the small island of Labuan in the State of Sabah, Malaysia to teach English in the Chinese school system. After a year in Labuan, she was transferred to Tawau, a larger town on the coast of Sabah. There she worked as a supervisor of local teachers of English, traveling by motorbike to visit several different schools.

Despite the popular image of the hardships endured by Peace Corps volunteers, Laurie's postings were both fairly comfortable, with running (cold) water and electricity. The small wood houses were very simply furnished, and in Labuan all cooking was done on a kerosene stove. There were, however, no 'frills' like telephone, television or air conditioning.

After completing her two-year service, Laurie and her friend Judy spent three months traveling home, with stops in Thailand, Cambodia, Japan, The Philippines, Hong Kong, and several European countries including Germany, where she visited relatives.

Upon returning to the U.S., Laurie continued her teaching career as well as doing graduate work at Bread Loaf School of English, part of Middlebury College in Vermont. There she met and became friends with Mary Pesez, who later introduced her to her cousin Andy; a year later Laurie and Andy were married. In 1972 their daughter Michelle was born, followed in 1975 by their son Andre (named after his father). When Andre was three years old, Laurie returned to teaching.

Andy was working for General Electric and, in the following few years, they were transferred to Georgia, Massachusetts, Rhode Island and back to upstate New York. In 1979 Andy was offered a position with another company with the opportunity to move to the Houston area. They lived there (in the Spring area) for fifteen years. During that time Laurie taught English and French at the high school level.

In the mid 90's, while attending their daughter's graduation from Trinity University, they met a couple from Kerrville with whom they would become friends. Laurie had been considering retiring from teaching and, as Andy would be able to continue his work from an area other than Houston, they decided to move to Kerrville.

Laurie had met June Hartley while teaching ESL classes and also attending yoga classes and June would occasionally talk about the UU Church. Andy and Laurie began visiting and eventually joined our church. In addition to her service as Secretary of the Board, she is also a member of the Adult RE committee.

In her years in Kerrville Laurie has volunteered for a number of groups, including Riverside Nature Center, Friends of the Library and CAM. She has also taken and taught a number of Adult ED classes. She is an active member of AAUW, Story Circle, and the Fourth Wednesday Book Group, which she founded in 1995. Her interests include yoga, writing and knitting; however, her primary passion is reading, and she tries to spend time every day with a good book.

We value your years of community service, Laurie, as well as your services to our Church. And we appreciate your generosity with your smile and with your words of appreciation and encouragement. We are so happy you are part of our Church family.
