November Feedback Circles Report

The following report was forwarded to the Newsletter Editor by President, Linda Smith and was altered only to fit the constraints of a newsletter format.

This month our questions focused on our communications efforts. We reached 26 of 39 members and friends, for a response rate of 62%. Please note that all numbers of responses do not always correlate as not all questions were consistently posed in the same manner. Following are the results of your responses:

Webpage:

- 9 had visited the webpage; 14 had not; 4 do not have computers

- 1 comment each as follows: concern at easily finding calendar events; site needs to be modeled after UUA website; it needs to include a clear welcoming of the LGBTQ community; one visits just to look at pictures; it was discouraging, needed more information about services, sermon titles and similar information; it is hard to read; wants current happenings instead of history; it needs to be more warm and inviting.

Facebook:

7 indicated they have visited our Facebook page; 15 noted they did not as they are not enrolled in Facebook
7 had "Liked" the Facebook page; 4 had not; 6 are not enrolled in Facebook

- 5 do not have or use computers.

- 1 comment each as follows: uses Facebook for event happenings as it is easier to read quickly; like that we have a Facebook presence as it is important for new, and perhaps younger, members looking for a church and its events; would like to see more UU information shared; thought Facebook is redundant

Newsletter:

- 20 noted they liked the format of the newsletter; however, many of those "likes" were qualified as "ok" or "fine" with comments

- 5 found it too busy and hard to read
- 3 do not like the format

- 2 expressed no opinion; 2 like the colors and two do not with one commenting they liked the gray scale option; 2 liked the calendar; 2 would like to see the calendar on one page

- 1 comment each as follows: it's good for feeling in touch when out of town; it's easy to read, colorful, and has a nice font; the paper copy is easier to read; it is more useful when consistently published before the first of the month; do not like the heading as it will not fit in email

Weekly Update:

- 17 liked the format although some of the yeses were "oks" or "fine" with suggestions

- 9 said one or all of the following: too busy, too convoluted, not easy to read quickly

- 5 stated that it is too much information for a weekly update and a desire to have only one week's events

- 4 do not like the format
- 3 have no opinion

- 1 comment each as follows: it works for them; "why there are so many TBAs?"; it should list all committee meetings and whether they are open or closed; the weekly update has become a weekly newsletter and has too much information

4 Sunday - 10am - Church Sanctuary: Speaker -Reverend Chuck Freeman. Subject; "Fling Off Your Bushel: Let Reproductive Justice Light Shine!" Description: "Vital rays of light leading to the Roe vs Wade decision were sparked at 1st UU Dallas. In the late 60's the Women's Alliance of the church began to study the abortion issue, eventually signing the amicus brief of the landmark case for women's autonomy that beamed a nationwide beacon of light!

Texas now has among the most restrictive abortion laws in the nation. We UU's have rested on our laurels in a dormant slumber for too long. We have overslept the alarm. It's time to wake up, stand up and let our lights shine for the sacred trust between a Woman, her Creator, and her Doctor. The Texas UU Justice Ministry (TXUUJM) is here to lead the light brigade!"

Rev. Chuck Freeman has been in the ministry since 1977 serving Church of Christ and Unitarian Universalist congregations. He is the founding minister of the Free Souls Church in Round Rock, Texas.
