From Our Minister's Desk

Working Together in a Lay and Clergy Partnership

As our Church explores the possibility of hiring a minister, I thought it would be timely to share a few observations from my five years with you. Most of you know I am serving as your first minister and this is my first ministry. Hence we have had a lot to learn, and have learned a lot, made a few mistakes, discovered together both our strengths and weaknesses, and made some good progress. There's nothing quite like a relationship for putting life to the test! Please know that I feel and have felt very supported by this Church. You are a unique group of intelligent and caring people with many lifetimes of practical and hard-won experiences. My life with you has been blessed...and challenged, especially these past couple of years; who's isn't? I deeply appreciate the opportunities you have given me to support you. Yet, as a congregation you have had my back through my recent marital demise, divorce and significant deaths, for which I will always be grateful. Thank you! I feel a strong sense of accomplishment coming from the work we've done together, and will continue to do

What might UUCHC anticipate in a Lay-Clergy relationship as it moves forward as a Church? Ideally a minister and the laity hope to work together happily, disagree without drama and feel supported in their roles for the betterment of the Church without the need to diminish each other. With an emphasis on mature social skills and a healthy dedication to the Church's core values and mission, lay members and a minister can find their way through any and all challenges. Hopefully we all learn from our past. This past five years of lay-minister partnership give proof of sustained positive relationships, movement through the challenges of dealing with change, adaptation of our ByLaws, development of practical policies and other milestones of maturation. It's important to showcase our successes to influence the entire Church positively. It'll be a beneficial and manageable process for our Ministerial Search Committee when our Church stands together in its desire to welcome a new minister, if that is what you choose to do.

Lay leadership is not the same as governance, just as clergy leadership is not the same as ministry. That said, we are always deeply grateful to our lay leadership for coming forth to lead. Still, the development of new and diverse leadership is important to the progress of any organization. Since UUs are an association of congregations, rather than a denomination with a hierarchy of top-down support, it is vital that our autonomous Congregation find new and adaptive ways to govern itself. I encourage our governing Board to welcome the influence of the next minister, even though in her/his ex officio status s/he will not have a vote. This united and forward movement of laity and clergy will make a vital difference to our future.

Ministry (meaning service) includes all the daily practical work of the congregation, no matter who does it. Our Church's ministries are shared ministries. Sometimes in a committee-based congregational structure, like we have, there can be conflicts both between lay leadership of a committee and the minister, as well as between lay leaders. A willingness to engage conflict together and not to avoid it is helpful and essential. It is also always advisable to provide clear job descriptions and divisions of duties, as well as checks, balances and evaluations. Our stated principle of the use of the democratic process may be messy and challenging, yet it can promote healthy and respectful congregational conversation, diversity in discussion and values-centered voting that helps us lean into the future together. Indeed it is our Church's best way forward.

The idea is to have clear roles, responsibilities and sufficient authority that leaves space for independent action and initiative, and fruitful interdependent partnership. Ideally all leaders, whether lay or ordained, will have firm boundaries, with some flexibility and clarity as to what to do and what to delegate. They will engage each other directly and not form triangles in order to go around each other and through someone else. That is not healthy. Firm boundaries are distinct from rigid boundaries or fuzzy ones. Rigidity breeds exclusion and secrecy, while fuzziness begets anxious checking in, checking on and checking back. Firm boundaries require clear guidance, willing accountability and unshakable respect for each other and each other's roles.

We all know it is not easy being a UU. Much is required of us in searching our hearts and minds to develop our own beliefs and practices. Many of us have had to reconcile past religious backgrounds, and in some cases families who do not understand our choices. Finding each other and this oasis in Kerrville has meant so much to us. This is to be celebrated! I know many of you also do not envy a UU minister, for we are UUs, too, and are similarly challenged in every way, as well as called to support other UUs in their lives, loves and learning. UUCHC is a wonderful sanctuary for liberal religion in the Hill Country. Being good at that is a challenge in itself. I write this article to inform and inspire, not to criticize or complain. I sincerely wish our Church much success and clarity in navigating a ministerial search, if that is what it chooses to do, and for progressing through all transitions into further growth as a loving and caring spiritual community. Please feel free to ask me should you have an interest regarding my experiences in serving as your minister. It has been, and continues to be, my honor.
