PASTORAL REFLECTIONS...

"What do we have in store for us?"

The modern "store" is a place we buy goods. The word comes from the same root as storage. Stores were places where staples for living were kept. Grains, salted meats, root vegetables, dried fruits, and other staples were deposited in storerooms for later consumption"

In modern stores, the sellers make the deposits. Our favorite H-E-B employee* goes into to restock when the store is closed. We shoppers come later, bring our cash or credit cards, pay for the food and take it home.

Our church is more like a co-op than a market. I was part of co-op once in Eugene, Oregon. I lived in an intentional community and did the shopping for our house of ten residents. We ate delicious healthy organic fruit, grains, vegetables and goods, and paid far them with less money than we would have spent at a grocery store.

Each co-op member put in a minimum of 30 minutes of volunteer labor each week. One reason I looked forward to my shift was the many hugs shared.

This was a big part of the culture of the co-op.

There was good music played. Cleaning and restocking happened in a joyous atmosphere. People often worked past the end of their 30 minute shift. It was a sweet time of love, friendship and service. Along with food, we filled up on the sweetness of connection.

A church doesn't store organic produce. As I see it, we come together for spiritual nourishment. We find encouragement and challenge, meaning and purpose. Much that we find in store was placed there by community members. Much that's stored was given by people that served in years past.

I would like to thank you for helping to maintain our "store" here at UUCHC. We know you have a choice where to put your energy and share your gifts. We wouldn't be the same without you!
